ASSISTANT/ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR

The University of Florida invites applications for a tenure-track assistant or associate professor of Mathematics Education to begin by August 2019. This faculty member will join a cohesive, collaborative, and energetic research community of STEM and education faculty committed to high quality scholarship, service, and teaching.

The successful applicant is expected to maintain a systematic line of research; seek external research funding; facilitate interdisciplinary research; contribute to K-12 mathematics educator preparation and graduate studies; and recruit and mentor doctoral students in mathematics education.

RESPONSIBILITIES:

- Conduct scholarly activities commensurate with expectations of a tenure-track mathematics education faculty member at a research-intensive university
- Demonstrate a commitment to diversity and equity in education through scholarship, teaching, and/or service
- Participate and collaborate actively with STEM and education faculty
- Pursue external research funding
- Publish in significant refereed journals
- Recruit, advise, mentor and engage graduate students in research
- Teach (face-to-face and/or online) undergraduate- and graduate-level courses
- Participate in program development
- Provide service to the program, school, college, university, and the profession

REQUIRED QUALIFICATIONS:

- Doctorate in mathematics education or closely related field, earned by August 2019 for applicants who are ABD
- Evidence of scholarship in the field of mathematics education as demonstrated through publications, grants, and/or presentations at national conferences, commensurate with experience

DESIRED QUALIFICATIONS:

- Record of P-12 teaching experience in the field of mathematics education
- Track record or evidence of potential to secure, and successfully manage externally-funded projects
- Commitment to collaboration with mathematics and education faculty, students and schools
- Teaching, research, and/or service experiences with diverse populations

Applicants should send: (1) a letter of application addressing required and desired qualifications, (2) curriculum vita, and (4) contact information for three references who will be asked to send a letter of recommendation through the online application system. 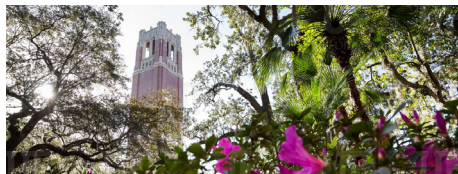
The selection process will be conducted in accordance with "Florida's Government in the Sunshine" and Public Records laws. Search committee meetings and interviews are open to

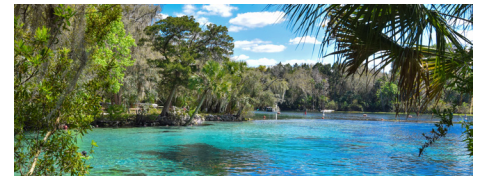
ABOUT THE COLLEGE: The College of Education at the University of Florida, founded in 1906, is ranked 14th nationally among public education schools in the U.S. News & World Report's 2019 survey of America's Best Graduate Education Schools, and ranks 24th overall. The College is the highest-rated education school in Florida and among public institutions in the southeastern United States. Two UF academic education programs consistently score among the very best in their specialty areas: Special Education and Counselor Education. U.S. News also has ranked the College's distance education programs first or second in the country for three years in a row.
